

Life in and around the Brandywine Valley

Our History

St. John's was founded in 1702. It is one of the oldest churches in the Country -- one of three churches in the surrounding area that were in existence during the American Revolution. The land upon where our church stands was donated by John and Margery Hannum. The original mid-18th century log structure first located in what is now the cemetery, was later expanded with an addition made of brick and stone. In 1844, the present "Church on the Hill" was erected, influenced by the Country Greek Revival style. The current Quaker-like simplistic interior continues to reflect an atmosphere of quiet reverence. Air conditioning was installed in 2007.

In 1707, Queen Anne presented solid pewter Communion-ware to St. John's. Delivered to our location from England by the parish's first Rector, the Reverend Evans, it has been used by fifty-three priests who have served St. John's throughout its long history. The antique pewter is still used today on special occasions such as Christmas and Easter.

After the Battle of Brandywine, soldiers from both sides of the American Revolutionary struggle passed by St. John's on Concord Road. It has been reported that some casualties of battle are buried in the cemetery. William Weston, who is believed to have carried the first "Stars and Stripes" into battle during the conflict, is presumed buried in the ceme-

tery. Unfortunately, archeological evidence of these events has been lost.

The Church Bell that calls parishioners to worship was acquired in the latter part of the 19th century from Holy Trinity Church in West Chester, Pennsylvania and moved to St. John's. The present tower that supports the 400-pound bell was originally constructed in loving memory of a former Vestry member but refurbished by the Boy Scouts under the leadership of an Eagle Scout candidate in 2015.

Worship

Our regular Sunday services are held in the church at 8:00 a.m., 9:15 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. The early service is a Rite I spoken Eucharist. The 9:15 service is focused toward family worship with Children's Chapel under the supervision of Margie Hatcher at the sermon time. Music is provided with organ and violin. The 11 a.m. service is the traditional Rite 2 with music and choir. There is also an 11 a.m. Communion Service offered most Wednesdays with Bible study following the service.

The laity are well represented during all services, serving as ushers, choir, lay readers, acolytes and chalice bearers, all of which are extremely visible roles. The altar guild and flower committees work diligently behind the scenes.

Education

During the school year, Sunday school classes are held between the 9:15 and 11:00 services for the youth of our Parish. Our Youth Group also meets during this time.

A new nursery (2019) is available for family use before, during and after services. Adult At St. John's, mission and outreach is viewed education classes offered Christian are Class, Lenten studies and a monthly Women's Spiritual Fulfillment Group.

Fellowship

Following the 8:00 am Sunday service and between the 9:15 and 11:00 services we participate in coffee fellowship in the Parish Hall. This is an opportunity for our parishioners to get together and share conversation and welcome new friends. At various seasons of the year, clean-up days are scheduled at the church to prepare for the season to come. perennial flower beds are maintained around the church property. Some of this is through volunteer work and is currently under discussion for future maintenance. Lenten dinners are scheduled during the holy season that offer yet another informal venue to get together. Various activities are planned for church fellowship throughout the year. They include a Welcome Back Picnic or Welcome Summer Picnic to begin or to end the church formal year; monthly Men's Breakfast; Ladies Book Discussion/Tea (since 1994); Wassail

Mission and Outreach

as an important part of our Christian mission. through Bible Study, Adult Forums, Inquirer's We perform two types of outreach ministries: monetary and hands-on support. Assistance is provided to St. Mary's, Chester with monthly monetary donations and bi-monthly delivery of food and supplies donated by parish members. Every Wednesday Costco provides additional food donations that are taken for dispersal at St. Mary's. Chester Eastside ministries are supported through donations of school supplies, Thanksgiving turkeys, hams and food items; the Christmas Giving Tree which benefits the children of Chester and the Phoenix Afterschool Program — a program that provides a safe after school resource for tutoring, homework help and cultural entertainment.

> A group from the parish provides worship once a month at Fair Acres, a local geriatric center. Maris Grove, an adult community, is supported through a monthly worship service for our St. John's members and any other resident who wishes to participate.

Organizational Structure

St. John's is located in the Diocese of Pennsylvania, under the supportive leadership of Bishop Daniel Gutiérrez. The Diocese covers a five county area in Southeastern Pennsylvania.

St. John's shows a positive interest in Diocesan affairs. Representatives are sent to the annual diocesan convention, and members of our congregation have served in key roles in the diocese.

Our Vestry consists of nine elected members and three Wardens. We have several effective committees within the church that help to carry out our mission and ministries including

Buildings and Grounds

St. John's Concord is located in Concord Our pastoral care ministry reaches out to nur- Township, Delaware County, Pennsylvania. An extremely desirable place to live, work, raise a family, retire or own and operate a business. We have an excellent school system, Garnet Valley School District, and excellent healthcare providers.

> The St. John's Church property encompasses nearly 15 acres at the intersection of Concord and Cheyney Roads. Our church, rectory, a cemetery, buildings and grounds provide support for all areas of worship. The church seats 150.

The present church building was erected in 1844 and is well maintained. Air conditioning was installed in our church in 2007 making our worship space much more inviting especially during the summer months. In addition to the church, the other buildings on the property include a parish hall and rectory, a cemetery that dates back to the eighteenth century, and a large playground refurbished in 2019. The grounds include perennial beds that splash the property with an array of color to enhance the beauty of the property.

This phase will start in facilities a great many improvements have the near future. As a result of these structural been made to the Parish Hall. Starting in 2002 the main hall was updated. Now called the James/McKean Hall, it invites social gatherings of various types. Most recently, our Capital Campaign Project launched and executed Phase I and Phase II of this renovation. \$880,000.00 was raised for this project. Phase I included the Fr. Battin Lounge, Choir Room and Archives room. Simultaneously a great deal of work was done to the Nicole Marie Room to refresh and provide storage for various groups utilizing that room. A new heating system and air conditioning was added to these areas to make them more useable throughout the church year. Phase II captured the space that was once a courtyard and turned it into 1) the 1702 Room; 2) a new nursery; 3) Handicap-accessible restrooms for women and men. To be completed is the "Memory Wall" which will be housed on the

improvements we can identify: 4 meeting rooms, 5 offices, 7 Sunday School classrooms, a nursery, the choir room, an Archives room, a full kitchen and a start on a refurbished playground to include a Handicap swing set plus a large parking area which completes the grounds and supports the churches many activities.

The Rectory is also included on the church's property. This charming country home is provided for our rector. The dwelling includes 4 bedrooms and 2 1/2 baths, and is currently being renovated featuring new HVAC, a new master bathroom, a new kitchen with new appliances and fresh paint. The Rectory overlooks the entire church property and is accorded magnificent sunsets from its location on the top of the hill.




Finance and Stewardship




The Diocese of Pennsylvania

The most visible sign of Diocesan life is the annual visit by the Bishop, who presides at our worship services of Holy Eucharist and Confirmation. The Bishop of our Diocese is the Rev. Daniel Gutiérrez. Since there are 134 Parishes and Missions within the Diocese of Pennsylvania, and approximately 41,000 Communicants, the Bishop is regularly assisted in this ministry by retired Bishops and Bishops from around the Anglican Communion. The Diocesan Offices are located in Norristown with the Cathedral present in the historic district of Philadelphia.

The Diocese of Pennsylvania is steeped in history. It is the home of many firsts, including hosting of the first General Convention of the Episcopal Church, the first authorized American Prayer Book, the first Episcopal Sunday School, the first African American congregation, the ordination of the first African American priest and women to the priesthood. The Diocese is the second oldest in the Episcopal Church and the fourth largest in members.
