INVOCATION

The meeting began at 9:20 AM with prayer offered by Rev. Jill.

APPROVAL OF LAST YEAR'S MINUTES

A motion to approve the minutes of the annual meeting held February 27, 2022, was made and seconded.* Unanimously approved.

REPORTS (Refer to meeting booklet for full written reports)

- A. <u>Rector</u>. Rev Jill's report was sent via email, shared at the meeting, and is on file for all to review. Rev. Jill highlighted our new logo based upon our historic oak tree, and lifted up Parish Administrator, Jen Troutman for her work on the website and log. Rev Jill also recognized Rev Terry Dinovo and his contributions to our parish.
- B. <u>Rector's Warden</u>. Danielle lifted up the fact that St. John's has seen an increase of new people coming to both worship and fellowship events. She asked members to be agents of welcome by seeking out newcomers and inviting them to join you for events.
- C. <u>Finance Report and Budget</u>. Burt Blackburn shared that the parish finances continue to remain strong due, primarily to the support of the entire congregation. Though the 2023 budget has a planned deficit, the Vestry will revisit the budget mid-year to see if any changes need to be made.
- D. <u>Pastoral Care</u>. This year Rev Terry Dinovo breathed new life into our Parish Care Team and he spoke about this important ministry.
- E. <u>Giving Train Update:</u> Danielle Yoch thanked Carol Angus and the original Auction Committee; and thanked the Vestry, Men's Breakfast, and other parishioners who made our fall fundraiser a success, especially our "Live Train Stop," Partytown which was a great night of celebration complete with parishioners from age 12 to 90 out on the dance floor. Details of expenses and money raised can be found in the full report.

RECOGNITION OF 2023 UNSUNG HEREOS

Rev. Jill recognized Carol Angus for her dedication to our music program; Dorothy Collman for her tireless work as volunteer bookkeeper; Cliff Holgate as our parish archivist; and Sandy McKinley for providing a welcome space for Sunday Coffee Hour.

PRESENTATION & ELECTION OF VESTRY NOMINEES

A slate was nominated. Second 2-year Term: Jacqui Dunn, John Pachkowski, and Tracey Payne. Third 2-year Term: Bill Calhoun and Mary Pat Lynam.

When no nominations were received from the floor, a motion was made and seconded* for the slate of five persons be accepted as presented and elected. The motion passed unanimously.

RECTOR'S REPORT: See how they love one another!

On his last night among his friends, Jesus urged his disciples to love each other the way that God loves them, wholly and completely (John 13:35). Jesus told those gathered around him, that everyone will know that we are his disciples by the love we share. In the century after Jesus's death, early Church father Tertullian, writing to explain how those who follow Jesus worship and act in the world, imagined that non-Christians would remark to themselves, "See how they love one another!" As I reflect on our past year together, this phrase rings through my memory.

Our Pastoral Care Team has revitalized their ministry in our parish. From the prayer shawls our parishioners send to loved ones who need comfort and strength as they wrap themselves in fabric, to the healing prayers offered on Sunday, to meals brought to parish families, the ways we lift and support each other in our times of deep need proclaim our love for each other.

Our remarkable choir has devoted themselves to service and prayer as they boldly lead our congregation in joyful song each Sunday, lead by dedicated choir facilitator Carol Angus. We shifted and adjusted our worship times (8:00 or 8:30?? 10:30 or 10:00??) trying to find the best fit for our congregation, with everyone giving and taking minimal grumbling. And our congregation is bouncing back after the long COVID pandemic: we are welcoming new parishioners, from families with young children to elders who have moved to our area. Our average Sunday attendance, though still lower than it was pre-pandemic, has increased from 76 in 2022 to 88 in 2023. And I have no doubt that one of the reasons is that, when new people come through our doors, they see and experience the deep connection and belonging found in our St. John's family. *See how they love each other!*

We've continued to share the abundance God has gifted to us, fully paying our pledge to the Diocese for the work of the wider Church. We support two partners in Chester, St. Mary's Food Cupboard and Chester Eastside, and never forget our brothers and sisters in Guatemala, lifting up our sister parish in prayer and financial support. Our monetary gifts are signs of the love we have for one another.

In April, my Celebration of Ministry was the most joyful outpouring of love and hope in God's call to us. Our sanctuary was packed full as Wardens Danielle Yoch and Bill Calhoun presented me to Bishop Gutiérrez as the 54th Rector of this historic parish. The memory of this day still fills me with a deep, abiding happiness.

More than 300 years ago, a small and faithful group founded our parish believing that St. John's could be a sign of God's love in the wilderness that was. I am deeply grateful that God continues to nourish and bless our congregation, so we can shower our community with the love and blessing we have received, so that all who hear about St. John's will remark: *See how they love each other!*

SAINT JOHN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH FINANCIAL REPORT

Annual Financial Report 2023

As in the previous year we have closed the 2023 financial year in a positive position due to the continued commitment and generosity of our congregation who continue to bless and support the parish community of Saint John's.

We ended the year with a positive balance when comparing our revenue with expenses.

2023 revenue: \$325,574.05 2023 expenses: \$316,703.12 \$8,870.93

- Our revenue for the 2023 increased by \$15,404.75 over 2022 revenue.
- Our total Pledge income for the year was \$217,374.31, our budgeted amount was \$212,000.
- Our expenses for 2023 were \$34,971.33 less than budgeted the budgeted amount of \$351,674.45, which contributed to the elimination of the anticipated 2023 budget deficit of almost \$32,400.

- Our Giving Train for 2023 continued its successful journey generating over \$22,000 to fund a number of parish projects including youth, outreach and the general fund.
- When reviewing the 2024 budget, you will notice a deficit of \$14,399.77. There are a number of contributing factors including the diocesan suggested cost of living salary increases, an increase in our diocesan parish assessment and the anticipated increases in our utilities and other fixed expenses. The good news is our surplus funds from 2023 will lower our anticipated deficit to approximately \$5,528.84.
- We have started this financial year showing a deficit which is substantially less than the past 2 years. As in the past we have been able to meet our financial challenges. We will continue to review our financial situation as the year progresses and will revise as needed while reporting any changes to the parish.
- Special Note: When reviewing last year's revenue, you will notice we did not include the 2022 Giving Train Contribution to our operating revenue for 2023. The good news is that the Vestry proposed and approved the establishment of a Contingency Fund to offset any unanticipated building repairs or expenses. This restricted fund will only be utilized at the discretion of and approval by the Vestry. This fund is established with \$7,450 from the 2022 Giving Train budget contribution.



CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE

The last few items on the current Parish Hall Renovation Project were completed in 2023. This marks the end of this project and the capital campaign to fund it. The project phases and costs are shown below.

Phase 1 - new windows, HVAC, floors, ceiling, lighting in the back and side of the parish hall - \$235,000 Phase 2 - cover the courtyard, new rooms (1702, nursery, attic), new handicap accessible rest rooms, revised HVAC for the building - \$650,000.

Phase 3 - new office space for the administrative assistant and rector, new reception area, dish storage room, handicap accessible front ramp, wall plantings for the front flower bed and side entrance, new energy efficient windows and doors - \$175,000

Total cost of the 3 phases - \$1,060,000

This total project was completed without borrowing of any kind through the generosity of the parish family with pledges and bequeaths. For all who contributed to this project our deep appreciation. I think everyone will agree that our church facility is much the better for this work. For those that continue to contribute to the capital campaign, I have asked our treasurer to keep this account open so that future capital projects can be funded from this account.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT: Sunday School

Discern and Pivot are the two words that best sum up our year in Children's Education. Regular Sunday School time of 9:30 AM did not work for most families. We usually had between 2 and 4 children for Sunday School with much higher attendance in Children's Chapel, which took place during the 10:00 Service. Getting children to Church before the service was a real struggle for most families and, instead of being a source of learning and fun for the kids, our early morning Sunday School was serving mostly to

make their parents feel slightly guilty. That's not at all what we want! So, we pivoted. We made the decision towards the end of 2023 to "flip" the two and are now having "Children's Chapel" available at 9:30 (so parents can attend the adult classes) and "Sunday School" is now during Church, with the children leaving earlier but still coming back in time for Communion. So far, this seems to be working and the children are happy with the new format.

A couple of observations are in order regarding these two programs and how they help our children. Learning about God, Jesus, and life in Church is, of course, important. It's also important for the children to learn to work together with tolerance and compassion. We are all so different and a Sunday School with more children means more opportunity to learn to work together and listen to other viewpoints. It's also a time to fine tune motor skills and focus by doing crafts and activities that also teach us about our relationship to God and how to find our place, not only in the world but in any given situation. The children are learning how to fit in, where they fit in, and how to gracefully make room for others when they share in group discussions and activities. Today's post-COVID world is a time that many children (and some adults) are learning or re-learning how to communicate in ways that don't cause division. They are finding ways to be heard and ask questions without silencing those around them. These are vital and necessary skills. This is what we hope to provide more effectively with our new Sunday School timeslot.

This does not diminish the importance of quiet or one on one time. While we had very few children for the early morning session, that does not negate the importance of what happened there. Children experience so many things in their day to day – joy, loss, bullying (as well as trying not to bully others) and it's difficult for them to process sometimes. When they are going from activity to activity, when they are studying or playing, they aren't always able to process the things they are seeing and feeling This is where, occasionally, the early morning at Church is important for the children. We found that, even when presented with the opportunity to stay upstairs and enjoy Coffee Hour with the adults during the holidays, most of the children wanted their quiet time. They wanted to talk and tell stories about what was happening in their lives. They wanted a little bit of peace.

We have a mirror on the wall at the bottom of the stairs leading to Sunday School. Above the mirror we have sayings like "Child of God". Each child has a handprint with their name on it and these surround the mirror. The children, as they come downstairs, high five themselves and say, "I'm awesome!". Some of the children have put their handprints up high so they have to jump up. Some have to reach down. But they all do it. Even when they don't feel it, they high five themselves and say "I'm awesome!". We remind them that they are loved by God and by the people around them.

This seems simple, but it's a way for kids to tell themselves that they are worthwhile. They are learning to remind themselves that they are awesome and loved. It's a skill that, hopefully, they will carry with them as they continue to learn and grow. It's a skill that we, with God's help, will continue to teach.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Youth Group

The Youth Group has a strong following with about 10 youth attending regularly. Our goal is to provide a safe place for our youth to connect with each other and God. We meet twice a month, along with volunteering at Saint John's and in the community. THE GREEN TEAM

In November a group of parishioners answered a call to explore how we might better utilize the "back forty" of our acreage. The result was the birth of a ministry to enhance our stewardship of the natural resources entrusted to St. John's. We, as an ecologically-minded group, the "Green Team", want to be intentional about our efforts, for our efforts to be sustainable, and to communicate them with and enlist support and participation of the entire parish. Ideas include actions like planting pollinators and perennials; creating habitats for birds and butterflies; focusing on reducing waste through more recycling and using fewer disposable/single-use products; and creating ecology-based opportunities for fellowship, spirituality, and engagement with the congregation.

Plans have been made. A monthly series with gardening tips and workshops will begin Sunday, Feb 25th, when we'll learn about Lenten Roses, an early-pollinator-friendly plant with a liturgically timely name, and

we'll be able to transplant one to take home. We plan to celebrate Earth Day on Sunday April 21st with activities such as planting a Stewartia tree, with some pointers how we might be successful in doing so on our own; learning about commonly used herbs, and perhaps transplanting one for home; and touring church grounds to become familiar with current plants and to begin imagining where we can go next as good stewards of St. John's.

Anyone interested in participating as a member of the "Green Team" is invited to join us. Dates of team meetings and info on activities for the congregation will be published in the eNews and on Sundays.

MISSION AND OUTREACH

In 2023, the Mission and Outreach Committee again had a positive impact through several projects and commitments. The continued generosity of our parish community is a blessing to those we were able to assist.

Saint Mary's Food Cupboard

We continued to help Saint Mary's with a monthly \$100 donation from our Outreach funds for a total of \$1,200 as well as our weekly food delivery of food and supplies donated by parish members. We are still receiving resources donated by Costco which are also delivered by John Keenan, Ronni Liberi, Darree Clark, Debbie Miller & Maria Warlow. In addition to our usual donations, \$900 in checks and \$240 in gift cards were donated to St. Mary's. These were all given in honor of Marti & John Keenan and Carol & Bill Angus' 60th wedding anniversaries.

Chester Eastside Ministries

We supported Chester Eastside Ministries in several ways:

- *Lenten Offerings* This year we asked for donations for Chester Eastside Food Pantry during Lent. We sent a \$500 check shortly after Easter.
- *School Supplies* We collected school supplies and backpacks. We provided needed school items and supplies to assist Chester Eastside students as they began their school year. We filled Burt Blackburn's jeep again this year and know these items will make a real difference in the lives of children in the community.
- *Thanksgiving* -We continue to support their Thanksgiving food drive. We contributed more than 20 turkeys. The Youth Group helped pack Thanksgiving dinner bags & distribute those bags.
- Christmas Gift Cards This year Chester Eastside again requested we provide gift cards instead of gifts allowing parents to purchase items for their families. Parishioners generously provided \$1,490 requested gift cards to Target & Walmart. Operations Manager, Tiffany Kea, said, "God bless you all. We really need this since we didn't get as many gift cards this year. This is a real blessing."

Guatemala and San Andreas Companion Parish

Our support of our Companion Parish in San Andrea Itzapa, Guatemala continues. To ensure the congregation of San Andreas has a place of worship, a meeting spot for educational opportunities and youth group activities, we continue to send rent money of \$225 per month.

A special shout-out to Carol Angus, our 'choir facilitator.' Carol tirelessly plans the anthems our choir offers twice a month, and weekly during the important liturgical seasons of Advent and Lent, along with additional music for our Christmas Eve and Easter celebrations. In the absence of a permanent choir director (Rev Jill continues to search for someone to fill this position), Carol has kept the choir engaged and singing beautifully as she directs our choir.

Musical support has been provided by several guests organists throughout the year, most often provided by Laura Seidelmann, Mary Eileen Johnston, Hugh Kronrot, and Carol Angus. Rev Jill looks forward to hiring a permanent church musician in the coming year.

PASTORAL CARE

On December 12, 2022, Reverend Terry reconvened the Pastoral Care Committee, a long-standing committee at Saint John's that had suspended regular meetings during the COVID pandemic. At this meeting, we reviewed the ministries that had been the focus of the committee in past years, and discussed how to go about resuming this work. The Pastoral Care Committee, including Rev. Terry, Diane Carlin, Darree Clark, Dottie Collman, Carla Durdan, Joy Embree, Peggy Long, Nancy McKean, Russ Roegner, Ted Stipa, Maureen Thompson and Philip Thompsen continued to meet regularly during 2023, and pursued a number of initiatives to revitalize its work:

- A Prayer Chain, whose members are committed to regularly praying for those on the Saint John's
 Prayer List. Drawing from the work of the Transition Prayer Group, Philip Thompsen worked with
 Rev. Terry and Jen Troutman to respect privacy concerns when sharing information with prayer chain
 members, and to implement a new system for sending Prayer Chain members email notifications
 whenever a change is made to the Prayer List. Jen also added a form to the Saint John's website
 where prayer requests can be submitted online.
- A Prayer Shawl ministry, with volunteers knitting or crocheting prayer shawls to be given to the newly baptized, to those needing healing comfort, and at other appropriate times. Carla Durdan led the effort to organize a team to make shawls and label and distribute them. Many of the shawls were put on display in the church, and parishioners were invited to take them as needed.
- A Card Ministry, with volunteers sending out birthday cards, "Get Well" cards, and other notes of greetings and encouragement. Peggy Long led this effort, building a team of volunteers, putting together a schedule for sending out cards, and working with team members to address cards and add handwritten notes on Saint John's stationary.

- A Healing Prayer ministry, offering parishioners a time to receive healing prayers after Sunday morning worship. Ted Stipa organized this effort to regularly offer healing prayers at the front of the church sanctuary after the 10 a.m. service. Many have since taken advantage of this opportunity.
- A Parkinson's Support Group. Darree Clark worked with Rev. Terry to establish a regular support group meeting for those with Parkinson's disease or those caring for them. This group has been meeting on the first Wednesday of each month, with meetings open to the community.

In 2024, the Pastoral Care Committee will continue to meet monthly to review current ministries, to learn ways parishioners can participate in ministry here at St. John's and to discover new ministries to enrich the lives of our members and the community of which we are part. New members are always welcomed. Please contact Rev. Terry for meeting times.

PROPERTY/GROUNDS

This last year has been an active year for the Property Committee with numerous planned and unplanned repair and upgrade projects for the Buildings and Grounds.

The Property Committee of St. John's would like to submit the following list of accomplished projects in 2023. This list reflects the hard work of all the committee members on behalf of our church.

Grounds:

- An Eagle Scout Project by Aiden Neff was completed last Spring. An 18X18 foot slate flagstone patio was placed around the fire pit and the top row and a half of broken fire pit blocks were replaced. The area around the fire pit was cleaned and trash and excess sticks were removed.
- A combination trash/recycle receptacle was installed by the sidewalk between the Parish Hall and Playground. The funds for this project were donated by a member and the receptacle was built by the Property Committee.
- Chalking on the sidewalk leading to the front of the Church was repaired/replaced to prevent damage to the retaining wall from freezing and the new ADA sidewalk along the Parish Hall was caulked to prevent water intrusion in the Sunday School Area. Mortar in the steps leading up to the Outreach Door on the Parish Hall was repaired.
- Spring and Fall cleanups were a big success this year with over 30 volunteers from Church members, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts, and Brownies at each. We thank everyone who participated.

Buildings:

- A remote-controlled advent wreath winch was installed in the Church and significant wiring was carried out to support the A/V upgrade. We would like to acknowledge Ron Hammer for his lead efforts.
- Funded by donations to the Giving Train, the downstairs Sunday School Girl's rest room was updated and converted to a Unisex bathroom. The vanity, sink, and mirror were replaced and the toilet divider was repainted. The boy's bathroom has been converted to the new Janitor's closet.
- With the completion of the Parish Hall project, the kitchen was reorganized to optimize location of and access to supplies and equipment. Work continues to improve the management of the kitchen facilities and utilization during events.
- During the annual maintenance/inspection of the Parish Hall heating boiler, a significant hole was found in the Primary boiler's heat exchanger. The heating load has been transferred to the auxiliary boiler and a new boiler has been ordered and will be installed in the next month.

• In 2021, one of the 3 large split heat pump units in the Parish Hall fails due to an electrical fire and would have to be replaced. It was decided wait to see if we could operate with the 2 remaining units alone. It has been determined that we need to have the 3 units to handle larger crowds during the hottest days. The unit will be replaced in 2024.

SAFETY COMMITTEE

A newly formed Safety Committee has been brought together to address the ever-changing needs of Saint John's as we continue to grow and prosper as a congregation and a resource for community-based programs/activities. Assistance and education will be provided by law enforcement entities at the State and Federal levels. The committee will ensure ongoing communication with Rev. Jill and the vestry to make recommendations for overall safety improvements based on assessments and recommendations received. STEWARDSHIP

We are all stewards of St. John's and your individual contributions of Time, Talent and Treasure were outstanding in 2023. All these contributions enable St. John's enable us operate our services each Sunday, maintain our facilities and our missions to meet the needs of our parishioners and our multiple outreach ministries.

Your treasure allowed us to exceed our goal of \$210,000. Thank you all for providing the capital that we need to meet St. John's mission. As we start 2024, we are pleased to report that we are well on our way to exceed our \$215,000 goal. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

Another key component of stewardship is the time and talent portion. We are fortunate to have members who give their time and skills so that we can operate the church. Many volunteer hours are spent by individuals and teams on weekly services, property management, treasury and finance, Christian education, office administration, live streaming services, the Vestry as well as a host of other activities.

In 2022 we estimated to volunteers spent about 4200 hours supporting our operations and ministries. This past year we estimate that those hours have increased to over 4500 hours. The complete redesign of our live streaming services, the installation of 2 additional cameras and the addition of amazing graphics on the broadcasts required many hours. On the property front, major efforts and hours have been spent on our heating and air conditioning systems in order to delay replacement of very expensive equipment. Translate the 4500 hours of volunteer work in to dollars at \$15 an hour amounts to \$67,500: Funds that we don't have to take out of our operating budget.

Stewardship is strong at St. John's and we thank you all for being strong stewards. Respectfully submitted, Gerry Tierney

TECHNOLOGY

The Tech Team at Saint John's grew out of the need to live stream worship services during the COVID-19 pandemic. Now that we have returned to in-person worship, we have focused more on improving the production of live streams and recordings for those who may be unable to attend, would prefer to worship online, or would like to watch a recording of the service.

During 2023, we have implemented a number of improvements to our live video streaming capabilities. We now have three cameras that provide three different viewing angles of the service. This includes two cameras mounted on the balcony and one camera near the front of the church. We also have a video switcher, which enables switching between cameras, as well as superimposing hymn lyrics, scripture references, prayers and other graphics over the lower third part of the video. To help provide a more stable signal with limited internet bandwidth, we now use a "restreaming" service which sends our signal to multiple destinations. We currently can be viewed on YouTube, our public Saint John's Facebook page, and the private "Friends of Saint John's" Facebook group.

In 2024, the Tech Team plans to install additional microphones to improve the audio quality of our broadcasts. We also hope to incorporate pre-recorded video segments, including an opening welcome video from Rev. Jill. And we are looking into additional destinations for the video stream, such as Instagram Live.

Members of the Tech Team include Gerry Tierney, Philip Thompsen, Patti Doyle, Ron Hammer, Paul Pearlman and Glenn Wikel. We also appreciate the additional contributions from Evan Willoughby, and Will Durdan. We welcome your comments and appreciate your feedback. 
