A Service for Those Who Find This Season Difficult

Welcome to our Longest Night Liturgy, sometimes called a "Blue Christmas" service. For some people, memories of past experiences and the pain of present situations can become overwhelming during a season when much of society professes joy and wonder. Christmas and New Year's Eve can be a difficult reminder of the challenges in our lives. In this service, we invite you to listen, to pray, and to sing. We invite you to meditate upon the pain and sorrow you may bring—and we invite you to offer this pain to God. May you find hope and comfort in knowing that you are not alone, and though there are times we walk through darkness, the promise of the Christ child is that Love and Light, and not darkness, will be known throughout the world.

— GATHERING —

We prepare our hearts for worship in quiet prayer, prelude and song. Kindly refrain from talking for this time.

The Celebrant greets the People.

Words of Invitation

Celebrant: If I say, "Surely the darkness will cover me, and the light around me turn to night," darkness is not dark to you, O God; the night is as bright as the day; darkness and light to you are both alike.

Celebrant: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. **People: Jesus was in the beginning with God.**

Celebrant: What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

People: The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it.

Opening Collect Prayer

Celebrant: God be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray. O God, Holy Comforter, you are the source and redeemer of life. Only you fully know and understand the places that we find ourselves: between faith and doubt, light and darkness, hope and despair, joy and fatigue of spirit, peace and unrest. Help us to see beyond the darkness into your glorious light, to move in heart and mind beyond our grief and fear into your ever-present care; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,

one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Candle lighting

The four white candles are lit while the leader says:

Leader: On this longest night, we gather to remember that in the beginning, all was formless void and darkness; into that darkness our Creator spoke, "Light" and recognized its goodness. Tonight,

we light a candle for those we want to remember – we light a candle for whatever we need to let go of – we light a candle as a prayer beyond words – and we light a candle for hope.

Leader: Let us pray. O Gracious God, as you have called forth light from the void, and made the sun to know its going down and its rising: Dispel the darkness of our hearts, that by your brightness we may know you to be the true God and eternal light, living and reigning for ever and ever. **Amen.**

You are invited, during the following musical meditation or at any time during the service, to come forward to light a candle. This is the longest night — take all the time you need.

Once everyone has had a chance to come forward and light a candle, the following prayer is said:

Leader: Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake. **Amen.**

— WORD OF GOD —

The First Reading of Comfort and Hope

Lector: A reading of Comfort and Hope from the Prophet Isaiah.

Isaiah 40:25-31

To whom will you compare me, and who is my equal? says the Holy One.

Look up at the sky and consider: Who created these?

The one who brings out their attendants one by one, summoning each of them by name.

Because of God's great strength and mighty power, not one is missing.

Why do you say, Jacob, and declare, Israel,

"My way is hidden from the Lord, my God ignores my predicament"?

Don't you know? Haven't you heard?

The Lord is the everlasting God, the creator of the ends of the earth.

He doesn't grow tired or weary.

His understanding is beyond human reach, giving power to the tired and reviving the exhausted.

Youths will become tired and weary,

young men will certainly stumble; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength; they fly up on wings like eagles; they will run and not be tired; they will walk and not be weary.

Lector: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

People: Thanks be to God.

Lector: 'When the world is ending:' A reading of Comfort and Hope by poet Jan Richardson.

Look, the world

is always ending with a tenderness somewhere. that will break Somewhere your heart. the sun has come But, listen,

crashing down.

Somewhere

to be anything

but morose.

completely dark.

It has not come

somewhere

to cause despair.

It is simply here

with the gun, because there is nothing

the knife, a blessing

the fist. is better suited for Somewhere than an ending,

it has ended nothing that cries out more

with the slammed door, for a blessing the shattered hope. for a world

Somewhere is falling apart.

it has ended This blessing with the utter quiet will not fix you, that follows the news will not mend you.

that follows the news will not mend you, from the phone, will not give you the television, false comfort;

the hospital room. it will not talk to you about one door opening it has ended when another one closes.

Lector: God of comfort and compassion, in a season when others don't have enough hours in a day to get their lists checked off, their cards mailed, their presents wrapped, we have all the time in the world: to remember the loss that has stolen the joy of the season; to grieve over a job, a dream, a loved one; to sit in the shadows of our homes, too weary to move. God, hear our prayer.

People: Come, Lord Jesus, and shine your light on all that is filled with darkness.


